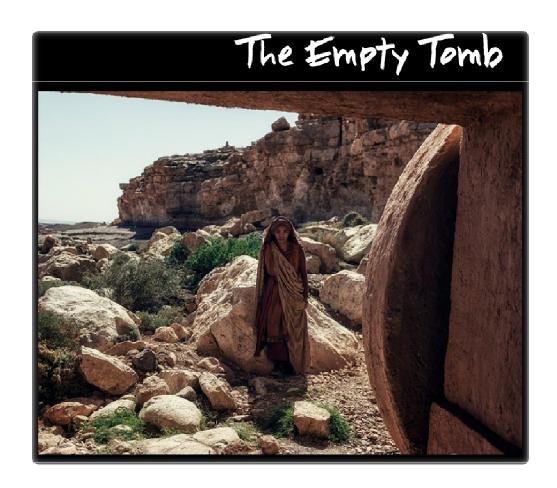

DEVOTION: The World Thirsts for Grace...

Grace is unique; grace is real. And grace can change everything, even in the world in which we live.

The scene was unfolding in London's Wembley Stadium. There was a massive musical celebration happening because of the changes in South Africa, rock bands blared and guests partied. Groups like Guns 'n' Roses blasted their music through speakers riling up the fans already high on booze and dope. For twelve hours the music rocked the stadium and they yelled for curtain call after curtain call. But for some strange reason, an opera singer, Jessye Norman, was scheduled to be the closing act. The crowd was sill wound up when Jessye approached the stage. Here's what happened next. Philip Yancey describes the amazing conclusion to that concert that again shows the uniqueness of God's grace.

Norman, as she moved to the stage... suddenly the crowd reacted. They wanted more Guns 'n' Roses. They didn't want to recognize an opera diva at the end of their revelry. This is what he said: Alone, a capella, Jessye Norman began to sing, very slowly:

Amazing grace, how sweet the sound That saved a wretch like me! I once was lost but now am found-Was blind, but now I see.

A remarkable thing happened in Wembley Stadium he said. Seventy thousand raucous fans fell silent before her aria of grace.

By the time Norman reaches the second verse, "Twas grace that taught my heart to fear, And grace my fears relieved...," the soprano had the crowd in her hands.

By the time of the third verse when she sang, "Tis grace has brought me safe this far, And grace will lead me home," several thousand fans are singing along, digging far back into near lost memories for the words that they've heard so long ago. What an incredible thing happened that night. Yes, like the song says:

When we've been there ten thousand years, Bright shining as the sun, We've no less days to sing God's praise Than when we first begun.

Jessye Norman confessed she had no idea what power descended on Wembley Stadium that night. But Yancy said, "I think I know. **The world thirsts for grace.** When grace descends, the world falls silent before it."

Today, dear friend in Christ - you who assemble to do the Lord's kingdom work - fall silent, yes. Find rest for your soul, yes. And start living the life of freedom in Christ because you are saved by grace. Grace will keep you now. Grace will strengthen you tomorrow, and grace will bring you home forever with God when nothing else can. Believe it.

Highlights of our Ministry in 2015-2016

Truly the Lord continues to shower down blessings on us at Our Savior Lutheran Church & School! We have been able to maintain our balance through stormy times, witnessing growth and maturity all around us.

It is no small gift of God's grace that we who are "nothing" (1 Cor. 1:18ff) in the overall history of the world, might be among those who carry his precious Word (2 Cor. 4:7ff). Though we too are fragile, and often crumble under the weight of our sin, he puts his grace on display in us like he did in Paul. We, like him, admit we are the worst among people, chief of sinners (1 Tim. 1:15ff) who give way to temptation, leaving his work undone. Yet he has chosen us to proclaim peace in Christ, in whom all dividing walls between us and God have been broken. By his compelling love (2 Cor. 5:14ff) we have been persuaded to KNOW him more, to GROW in serving him gladly and serving each other, to GO into all the world with the offer of free and full forgiveness. We need to pray more, to study his Word more deeply, to drink in his water of life and to lead others to his "wells" (WELS) of salvation. The Call still comes: to all who received him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God. The Commission still stands: "Go and make disciples." The Command still guides: love one another as I have loved you. And we can still carry the message of Christ and him crucified (1 Cor. 2:1ff) to a world that is perishing. Through the tornado of the capital appeal we learned that we cannot rest on the laurels of our history. For fifty years now God has poured out his grace and love on us at OSLC. We were blessed with a strong commitment to carry on that heritage, and as a result we've been able to re-position our finances for the long haul. Lord, what would you do through us to accomplish your vision for Our Savior? Help us, every day and every week, to find our calling in Christ to be meaningful and joyful. What a privilege to be a part of the family of faith!

Some of our local blessings include...

- Our Capital Appeal "Hope for Years to Come" brought the highest level of commitment of any of our appeals. Between the actual dollars that have already arrived and the commitments for the next three years we have been able to refinance and save thousands while reducing our monthly payment.
- Our lay leadership continues to pull together as a team. Our first step into a new Long Range Plan was to secure our finances for the upcoming years. Now, since the Lord has accomplished that among us, we can reformulate our goals and renew our MINISTRY emphasis, with the intent of expanding opportunities for people to connect with Word & Sacrament as well as with each other
- To KNOW: offering several different types of Bible Study offerings and levels of challenge
- Our Back Door: intentional and aggressive Elder & Shepherd emphasis on our straying and seeking opportunities for outreach, developing an expanded and committed visitation team
- Our Connect ministry has been revamped seeking informal ways to improve relationships, recruit and employ especially new members in service opportunities with better communication

inistry means service. We are all in the ministry together serving our gracious God by serving one another. This is a beautiful concept derived from the unconditional love of our Lord Jesus Himself, which translates into a different worldview. All around us are selfish, uncaring people who look out only for themselves. But "we" live with His unique point of view. Love comes down to us from above and so we begin to love others because of the love we ourselves have received (1 John 4:19). Love becomes our identifying mark (John 13:35) as we build the community of Christ together. "Our Savior" came down from heaven not to be served, but to serve and give His life as a ransom for others (Mk 10:45) To prove that this was his motto He washed the feet of his disciples and then gave them the New Command, "Love one another as I have loved you." (John 13:34). This full extent of his love carried him to the cross under and with our sin. In awe we watch our Lord serve us in life and in death. In greater awe we watch Him arise to lead and love again. In response we serve one another in our family of faith and for the good of those yet outside.

When we finally grasp how rich His grace is, (2 Cor. 8:9 evokes 9:11 & 1 Tim. 6:17-18) we live to build His kingdom. It is not a burden, but a privilege. To live is Christ and to die is gain (Phil. 1:21). Or as Paul put it in another passage,

"Though I am free and belong to no man, I make myself a slave to everyone, to win as many as possible. To the Jews I became like a Jew, to win the Jews. To those under the law I became like one under the law (though I myself am not under the law), so as to win those under the law. To those not having the law I became like one not having the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law), so as to win those not having the law. To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all men so that by all possible means I might save some. I do all this for the sake of the gospel, that I may share in its blessings. Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. They do it to get a crown that will not last; but we do it to get a crown that will last forever." (1 Cor. 9:19-25)

Therefore, let us learn to honor our God and our Lord (John 20:28) in our own lives individually and together in as we love others with the same love He has shown us.

Our ministry is a labor of love... His love working in and through us together!

PASTOR'S REPORT

hat a year of challenge as a pastor and a privilege again to serve at Our Savior! This year demanded more of my time in administration and shepherding the capital appeal process along with our consultant. The Lord has put us in a growing area and neighborhood and we've matured to the point where we can truly put a footprint on our communities. Having the financial stability offered by the successful campaign, we're ready for some real advances in ministry now: our facilties are in beautiful condition, our staff is stable, our budget is nearly balanced, our leadership is strong and our mission is the same - to GO with the Gospel into our communities. This year I'd highlight a smooth transition to part-time pastoral staff (Prof. Kock & Jeremiah Backhaus); the completed ministry of Kathy Collyard (retired at the end of the school year); the acceptance of our call (Katie Raddatz); and the incredible refinance of our mortgage with Thrivent Financial.

Regular areas of pastoral responsibility include:

- Worship planning, including creation of various services, coordinating music and maturing our contemporary service as part
 of a balanced, blended approach. To God be the glory! (Pastors Wagner, Kock, Backhaus, Kelm, Mr. Hering)
- Regular Bible Study planning, coordination, preparation and instruction (Pastors Wagner, Kock, Backhaus, Mr. Hering)
- Catechism instruction (3 times a week which includes the Public School Class) (Mr. Hering)
- Bible Information Classes (Fall, Spring, Summer) and Lutheran Survey classes as needed (Pastor W)
- Leadership, prayer and support for the elected leaders and their teams (Pastor W, Mr. Hering)
- Staff and Lay leadership, training and coordinating (Pastors W, Mr. Hering)
- Prospect calls and Encouragement calls, Counseling the Troubled and Straying (Pastor W)
- Assisting, encouraging presentations by laymen about ministry & management of our gifts (Pastors W, Mr. Hering)
- Administration of the church office, Overseeing Record keeping, Managing Business systems, Historical archives etc. (Pastor W, Mr. Hering)
- Supervising EFT students for liturgy and calls; supervising the Ozaukee Jail schedule and Sem students (Pastor W)
- Supervising EFT students for confirmation class (Mr. Hering)
- Pre-marriage meetings, arrangements and conducting of weddings (Pastor W)
- Funeral visitations and arrangements, along with prayer and ministry to the grieving (Pastor W, Mr. Hering)
- · Adding to and managing computer networks, machinery, communication tools, updating classrooms & church (Pastor W)
- Visitation ministry to care for souls unable to come to worship; Oz Jail ministry and bible study (Pastor W, Mr. Hering)
- Leading, Coordinating, and Training our Southeastern Wisconsin District Mission Board and mentoring Hispanic pastors
 (Pastor W)
- Supervising, Coordinating, and Distributing gifts for our WELS Committee on Aid & Relief throughout the world (Mr. Hering)

Goals for the new year:

- We will review, revise and communicate a new five year Long Range Plan to keep our vision/goals clearly identified and in sight.
- We plan on teaching and explaining our Vision Statement, biblically connecting the Christian family to their roles at home and in their community of Christ.
- We will continue our contact and communication among members, including more fellowship and service through CONNECT ambassadors
- We will again assess the priorities of our positions, streamlining, transferring or dropping responsibilities in order to conduct a more focused, intensive search for the lost.
- We will assess our Visitation Team results, free up Pastor W. for a personal & intensive effort to reach out to the wandering and disillusioned members of the congregation (My Savior emphasis continues).
- We will, through lay leadership, train and equip others who can help us maintain close contact with our prospects, manage our data base and recruit for Bible Information and Lutheran Survey classes.
- We will together take the resources which he assembles for us and through us to expand his ministry of the gospel.
- We will continue to prioritize personal study of the Word and time with our spouses, children and their families. We will seek to know Christ and his grace more fully this year that we may serve others with his heart of compassion and love.

STAFF MINISTER REPORT

Our Savior Lutheran Church and School Annual Voters' Meeting June 26, 2016

A FEW HIGHLIGHTS

- Our Sunday School staff faithfully served our children and families during the 2015-2016 year. We thank God
 for our teachers and helpers, who weekly share the saving news of Jesus. We continue a 3 year curriculum
 update for most of our classes.
- Three teachers rotated throughout the year to teach our Sunday teen class.
- Annual church/school picnic (planning in process for August 28, 2016). Please note that this is a new weekend
 for our picnic. For many years we have held the picnic the second weekend of August, but will hold it this year
 the Sunday after school starts. We will have regular Thursday worship that week, but only a single 10 am
 service on Sunday. There will be a need for helpers on Saturday, August 27, at 3 pm to help set up for the
 picnic.
- College Roll continues to serve some of our collegiate youth through emails, prayers, mailings and care packages. Number of collegians served (12-year average = 19):

- Christian Aid and Relief (synod work). I continue to serve our synod as a member of WELS Christian Aid and
 Relief. We regularly make decisions to bring physical relief to victims of natural disasters or personal tragedies
 in the form of cash grants, food, clothing, and medical supplies. We also partner with WELS missionaries to
 support humanitarian aid projects that can help build bridges to proclaim the gospel.
- KML Board of Directors. I continue to serve our KML High School Federation as a member of the Board of Directors, including on its Executive Committee.
- We are truly blessed to have several individuals who faithfully teach Bible classes for adults, teens, Sunday School and Lutheran elementary school.
- In the fall I continue to supervise two Wisconsin Lutheran Seminary students who assist in teaching our students Confirmation classes.
- We continue to use Facebook to share congregational and school information with our members and others.
 We are seeing an increase in Facebook interaction. During the weeks around major worship services and other events, we see high activity and engagement. We reached a new high of Weekly Total Reach of 2,501 around Confirmation weekend.
- Our church's Mom's Circle group continues to meet regularly during the school year. We thank the Lord for our leaders and for those willing to continue this meaningful gathering.
- Connect Ministry exists to help new members become comfortable in their new church home as well as help new and current members connect through experiences such as hobbies, life circumstances and other activities. This effort is proceeding with a very non-programmatic emphasis.

Our Hope for Years to Come

"We wait in hope for the Lord, He is our help and our shield." Psalm 33:20

Hope – this particular word as used in Scripture is beyond beautiful, beyond believable, and beyond blessed.

Beyond Beautiful – As sinful human beings living in a sinful world, we get excited when there is seemingly a little glimmer of hope that something good could happen in our lives. For example, in the lives of children at school, they may get excited when their teacher tells them that they may receive some extra recess time if everyone does their part in getting their desk cleaned and organized without talking. But it does not take long for that little bit of hope and excitement to cause one student to start conversing with another about what they will do when they get outside for recess. Now the sudden realization hits home pretty hard as the eyes of classmates are sternly fixed on them and the knowledge that not any one of them will have any extra recess on this day since one or two have effectively caused that hope to fade away. This kind of hope was short lived. This kind of hope fails to deliver because it depends on our weak and sin-tainted flesh and efforts. This kind of hope is really ugly. On the other hand, the hope that God gives to us is connected to His Word of truth and promise which He alone has kept perfectly in our place. It is a certain hope that cannot fail because it does not depend on us. It depends on Him who alone is holy, perfect and all-powerful. It depends on Jesus, and only Jesus. Therefore, it is beyond beautiful!

Beyond Believable – As Lutheran Elementary School teachers and God's called servants, we are entrusted with God's Word of truth and promise that we should extend to our students, who fall short of His mark, the certain hope of Christ's earned forgiveness. How can this be? We sin...and daily sin much. Our students sin...and daily sin much! (Please do not tell anyone that we have white fences around our school and issue glistening halos to all our students. That's not reality!) There is sin here just as anywhere. So, why would God forgive me? Why would God forgive anyone? It is too good to be true...beyond belief. It is even hard, yes, even impossible to rationalize. However, what it really is, is God's grace given to us through faith in Christ our Savior. It is spending time each day in the classroom studying God's wisdom which is foolishness to all who do not believe, but salvation to all who would call on His name by faith. It is beyond believable, but with God's gift of faith, it is ours and our childrens!

Beyond Blessed — Our Savior Lutheran School has been blessed over the last 49 years. Talk to just about anyone who has been within these walls and sat in the classroom desks and church pews, and you will hear how this infant church grew and stretched out, not just over these roughly five acres, but stretched out into the hearts of our communities, homes and families around us. We have been blessed to be able to proclaim God's love and forgiveness to His lambs each and every day of the school year — that amounts to approximately 8575 school days in 49 years. Now to some, that may seem like a lot, and to others that may not seem like much at all. But I would propose that if even just one lamb was brought to faith during those years and, as a result, is with their Savior today, is that not an incredible blessing beyond which God deserves to be praised forever? Fact is, there have been hundreds and hundreds of students who have sat in these classrooms and had their faith nourished and strengthened daily, and, at God's appointed time, He will gather even these His lambs to His side in heaven. How many more are there that need to hear what God has done for them? How many more are in our neighborhoods and backyards, on our community playgrounds and baseball fields and even in our families, that need to have that precious treasure of God's

mercy and grace in Jesus shared with them? Just think of the incredible blessings of faith worked in needful human hearts that God could work through our ministry to these lost sheep and lambs! Indeed it would be beyond all earthly blessing for sure!

As we go into our 50th year of Christian education, may God continue to be our certain HOPE! May we faithfully proclaim and teach His unchanging truth each and every day knowing that He will help us do this eternally important work of saving souls, and He will be our shield as we venture into an unknown future and what currently looks like a precarious and confused world in terms of morality and truth. To be sure, Satan will work hard to stop our efforts, but Jesus is on our side and by our side. We do not go this alone. May God bless each and every one of our members who join all of us in letting this sure and certain HOPE of God's love, forgiveness, and salvation be told beyond these walls of mortar and brick, beyond these halls and floors of carpet and tile, beyond anything that might hinder us from letting wandering souls know heaven is their home, because Jesus is their Savior! Indeed, it would be beyond beautiful! It would be beyond belief! It would be beyond blessed! To Him be the glory!

Here are some of the highlights of Our Savior Lutheran School as we proclaimed the HOPE we have in Christ through the school year:

2015 July:

- Even though Jill Klug started training as secretary in May and into June, July was her first full month solo in the school office. I want to acknowledge with great appreciation and thanks for all the time she committed over the summer to learning the in's and out's of this operation we call a Lutheran Elementary School. We are blessed to have her skills and talents and her passion for serving her Savior in our school office! Due to increased amount of administration tasks within the office, more hours were added to the secretarial position as approved by the 2015-16 budget.
- A number of parents volunteered time to thoroughly clean various parts of the school that typically
 does not get that much attention through the year. We thank the Parent-Teacher-Friends group
 for all theie efforts in organizing this as well as the support of Thrivent through their Thrivent
 Action Event which enabled us to get many of the supplies that were needed to get the cleaning
 accomplished.
- Mrs. Dierker attended a WELS Tech Conference and brought back information and resources that she shared with others on staff. This type of continued learning is very valuable for not just her, but for all of us on staff who can take this new information and incorporate it into our technology program for the benefit of our work and our students.

August:

- Faculty meetings were held throughout the summer to prepare for the upcoming school year. I am
 thankful for the various God-given educational insights and talents that each of our teachers bring
 to our meetings as we seek to enrich the lives of our students throughout the school year.
- The south and east walls in Mrs. Collyard's room received a fresh coat of paint. The remaining two
 walls will be reevaluated next summer.
- Pastor Wagner led our staff through a telephone system change. Ooma phone system was
 installed to be able to reduce overall monthly phone expenses, as well as give each staff member
 their own digital mailbox for incoming messages. This is a Voip or web-based phone system. We
 still retain our landline system for emergency numbers to the fire department as well as our
 intercom system to alert teachers and students to things such as tornado drills.
- Mrs. Diener, Mrs. Collyard and Mrs. Grulke attended the Early Childhood Literacy Conference held at Concordia University on August 3rd. This is a good conference for teachers to take a look at

- some of the best ways to help young students learn to read, write, and express themselves through use of high quality literature.
- Registration night was held on August 10th, and families received information about the classroom schedules, sports and other activities that were part of the school year.
- The total staff met to discuss a new form that would help teachers, pastor, staff minister, and secretaries in procuring and recording new family contact information that would assist the staff in working with a new family according to each staff member's role and responsibility. It was designed to help keep communication with a new family purposeful, timely, and meaningful without being seemingly or frequently bothersome with too many contacts made too close together.
- The school year began with a half-day on August 26 for grades K-8. Pastor Wagner led us in an Opening Service. 3K began after Labor Day on September 8 and 4K began on September 9. A typical school day lasts from 8:15 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. for grades K-8.

61 of our 100 graduating seniors (class of 2015) received renewable scholarships of \$2,546,080 over 4 years of college. The recipients received on average \$41,739 for each person. The class of 2015 was offered over \$4.3 million in scholarship dollars but had to pick and choose which ones would be accepted.

KML is part of the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program- In our first year the families of sixty students received voucher dollars to pay for the full cost of tuition. Fifty-eight of those students are currently members of our KML Federation. The tuition assistance dollars that would have gone to them were dispersed to more families who did not qualify for the program. This program will allow more people to enjoy the blessings of Christian education at KML!

Vision 2021- The Board of Directors has approved some significant initiatives that will be the catalyst of school improvement over the next seven years. Some key components of that vision are:

- 1) Reduced or eliminate the \$7 million debt
- 2) Increase the value of the high school ministry to the 28 churches of the federation
- 3) Evaluate and reshape the curriculum and faculty towards a sustainable and more powerful impact on future graduates
- 4) Manage increased enrollment from 400 to 500 students over the next seven years

Facilities

• The Building & Grounds Committee has begun an aging audit on the facilities and capital holdings on the KML campus. They have requested the establishment of a **long term maintenance fund** to be used for major repairs. This fund will be created by any operating surplus during this fiscal year. Future budgets will have an expense item that will used to increase the fund.

Faculty and Staff

- In September we installed two new teachers into our KML ministry. Mrs. Becky Mayer (Aman) is our new English teacher. Mr. David Kren is our new Biology teacher.
- We celebrate a combined 90 years of ministry with Wes Schmandt (25 years), Tim Kuehl (25 years), and Dar Schramm (40 years).
- Dar and Bonnie Schramm will be retiring at the end of the 2015-16 school year. Our

January

- The Lord continues to bless the *Make a Joyful Noise* campaign as we start the year with gifts and pledges totaling \$2,786,964. This includes 150 Builders (69 to *Make a Joyful Noise*) who support KMLHS through auto deposits!
- KML launched a dual credit pilot program with Grand Canyon University and Concordia University of Wisconsin. We have 13 students participating in our Dual Credit Pilot Program (9 at GCU and 4 at CUW). We are looking forward to learning more about benefits and challenges of these programs. At the same time, we will be exploring which of our current teachers may be qualified to teach dual credit courses here at KML.
- After 26 years of faithful service to KML, Mrs. Karen Bartman retired as the administrative assistant to the superintendent, and we welcomed Mrs. Melanie Schoeneck to fill the position.

February

- KML presented the drama *Father of the Bride* on February 20-22. The many attendees enjoyed the hard work and exceptional job of the play's cast and crew.
- KML Foundation awarded \$32,500 to KML for student tuition assistance.
- The Varsity Cheer Team earned a first place standing in their highly competitive division and was named the 2015 Division 3 Medium State Champions, the eleventh state championship for the program.

March

- The Charger Boys Varsity team finished the season with a 21-3 overall record and won the Flyway Conference championship with a record of 13-1.
- The Charger Girls Varsity team finished their regular season with an amazing 20-7 overall record and a 14-0 conference record, earning the team the Wisconsin Flyway Conference Championship for the fourth year in a row.
- 21 individual KML band members as well as the Percussion Ensemble and Jazz Ensemble qualified as WSMA state instrumentalists.
- WSMA vocal state qualifiers this year included the Madrigal Ensemble, Echoes Show Choir, Echoes
 Jazz Choir, and 10 individuals.

April

- The KML Cross Trainers completed their seventh year of going on mission trips across the US. The 17 Cross Trainers and their chaperones shared the message of Jesus in three states: Alabama, Texas, and South Carolina.
- The Annual Dinner Auction was held April 18 at the River Club of Mequon. Under the theme of "Masquerade Ball," more than \$112,000 (gross) was raised to benefit KML.
- Sponsored by the Washington County Sheriff's Dept. and the Coalition, KML students and faculty participated in the *Every 15 Minutes* program, an intense event which impacts students and teaches them not to drink and drive.
- A total of 35 students wrote 47 Advanced Placement tests in the following areas: Chemistry, Environmental Science, Spanish Language, Calculus AB, Calculus BC, English Language and Composition, Statistics, U.S. Government, German Language and Culture, Physics, Economics, and Music Theory.
- Of our 100 seniors, 68 received scholarships for the college of their choice. For the first year of college our departing seniors will receive more than \$750,000. If all their renewable scholarships are used, the total will exceed \$2.5 million!

 A Community Electronics Recycling Event was held at KML under the direction of Mr. Joshua Schoeneck. Approximately 60,000 pounds of electronics were collected for recycling, and the event raised \$1,000 for the KML Technology Department.

May

- The 100 members of the KML Class of 2015 graduated on May 23.
- We bid farewell to retiring instructors Mr. David Deibert and Mr. Thomas Mellon. Praise the Lord for their many years of faithful service to KML (Mr. Deibert 15 years, Mr. Mellon 23 years).

June

- This was the fifth year of KML's E³ (*E-cubed*) summer classes, with a wide selection of camps offered for our elementary students sports, cooking, Spanish, music, chess, computer programming, and much more!
- KML Spanish instructors Mrs. Barbara Olsen and Mrs. Micah Nelson led a trip to Spain from June 21-July 2 in which 21 students participated.

July

- The Mission Advancement and Student Services offices were restructured. Mr. Paul Snamiska who, for the past two years has held a combined role of estate planner, registrar, and director of student services, moved back in to mission advancement and estate planning full time. In the student services office, Mr. Jerry Zeamer continues to focus on admissions while Mr. Jason Walz accepted the position of guidance director. In addition to remaining KML's technology director, Mr. Joshua Schoeneck now also serves as registrar.
- The 26th Annual Kettle Golf Open was held on July 20 to support the KML golf team and athletic department.

August

- KML welcomed Mrs. Rebecca Kemnitz as the new International Student Program Coordinator.
 Mrs. Kemnitz took over this position from Mrs. Wendy Robinson who now focuses on her work as KML's Marketing Coordinator and Fine Arts Assistant.
- The fourth annual Kettle Klomp was held August 15. This event consisted of a 5K race and two mile walk. Proceeds were used to benefit KML.
- With the 2015-2016 school theme of *Saved to* Serve, KML began its 42nd year of serving our Lord. The enrollment for this year is 403, including nine international students from China and South Korea.
- With the start of the 2015-16 school year, KML began its inaugural year of participation in the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program. 62 KML students have been blessed to receive Choice funds from the state to pay for their tuition at KML. As a result, tuition assistance dollars from KML were reallocated to other KML students who applied for financial aid.

September

- Our Celebration of Ministry was held in the PAC on September 20. Installed during this service were: Miss Rebecca Amann (English instructor) and Mr. David Kren (science instructor). Significant years in the ministry were also celebrated by Mr. Timothy Kuehl (25 years), Mr. Wesley Schmandt (25 years), and Mr. Darwin Schramm (40 years).

Over 1,600 students and adults attended three matinee performances on October 27 and 28, and almost 1,300 people attended the public performances on October 30-31 and November 1.
- KML welcomed Mr. Bob Heider to the Fiscal Office. Mr. Heider is training under Mrs. Jeanne Kowalski and will take over Mrs. Kowalski's position when she and her family move out of state in early 2016.

November

- Our annual Veterans Day program was presented on November 5 to an audience which included 300+ veterans and guests. This year's focus was the flag folding ceremony. Reverend Timothy Bauer of Bethany, Hustisford, was our guest preacher. Of special note at this year's program was guest speaker, Governor Scott Walker. We thank all those who participated, and we thank those who serve us – and who have served – in the armed forces, and their families.
- KML was honored to host the WELS National Choral Festival on November 13-15. 460 students
 from 21 WELS high schools around the country performed in two concerts over the weekend: a
 pops concert on Friday night and a sacred concert on Sunday afternoon. Hundreds of families from
 KML Federation congregations opened their homes to provide housing for the guest choir
 members, and many others volunteered in numerous ways to make the event a memorable
 success.

December

- The KML Foundation sponsored two concerts by the popular contemporary Christian group, *Koine*, for the general public. Emmanuel Lux is Koine's latest Christmas concert which highlights the Christmas story with music and media.
- An anonymous friend of KML pledged \$255,000 to our ministry! A \$500 incentive gift will be given
