WORSDIP NOTES: We welcome you into the upper room, where we observe as Jesus began the new covenant with a new kind of covenant meal. The word Maundy which identifies this Thursday in Holy Week is derived from the Latin word which means "command." The name relates to the "new commandment" (see the Versicle) Jesus gave to his disciples while they were assembled in the upper room the night before his crucifixion. Holy Week is the story of God's love for the lost. Love links us to God in Christ. Love is also the feature that identifies us with Jesus. The Lord's Supper is Jesus' way of renewing the bond of forgiving love that binds him to us, and us to one another. All of the elements of our service today center our attention on what Jesus did to make his love real for us.

O King of heaven, Servant of God, great is your name and worthy of honor. For your supreme sacrifice, we praise you, O Lord. For your holy Supper that we will receive again this evening, we glorify you. For the gift of eternal life, we give you humble thanks. Send your Spirit, dear Savior, to help us in thankfulness to follow your example of humble service. Move us to have compassion on others and to seek ways to help them. Open our hearts and our lips to witness to your unconditional love. Be with us as you have promised. Amen.

INSTRUCTION FOR THE END OF LENT

P: In this Lenten season, we have heard again how our Lord walked the path of suffering which led him to the cross for our salvation. We have also heard our Savior's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death and the devil -- all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were committed at Baptism; God's forgiveness and the power of his Spirit to amend our lives continue with us because of his great love for us in Jesus our Savior. With the family of the church, God never wearies of giving peace and new life. In the Absolution we receive forgiveness as from God himself. This absolution we should not doubt, but firmly believe that thereby our sins are forgiven before God in heaven, for it comes to us in the name and by the command of our Lord. We who receive God's love in Jesus Christ are called to love one another, to be servants to each other as Jesus became our servant.

P: In the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

CONFESSION OF SINS

P: Let us confess our sins to God and ask for his forgiveness.

C: Almighty God, merciful Father, I confess to you that I have not loved you with all my heart. I have pursued my ways instead of your ways. In what I have done and left undone, I have not loved my brothers and sisters as myself. For this I deserve your punishment both now and in eternity. I am truly sorry for my sins. I repent of them. I beg for your mercy.

A brief silence for meditation may follow.

- **P:** Forgive us for the sake of Jesus Christ, who suffered and died for us.
- C: Cleanse me from my sins. Release me from my guilt. Grant me your Holy Spirit to amend my sinful life.
- **P:** The almighty God has been merciful to us and has sent his Son to die for all. For his sake he forgives us our sins and calls us from darkness to his marvelous light. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.
- **P:** Our Lord Jesus Christ has forgiven us and reconciled us to God and has promised us the power to forgive and love each other. Relying on his promise, therefore, be reconciled with one another.

ALL: Brothers and Sisters, may the peace of Christ rule in our hearts, in our words and in our actions.


I believe that Jesus Christ, true God, begotten of the Father from eternity, and also true man, born of the Virgin Mary, is my Lord.

* Due to unusual circumstances we are unable to gather together physically and share in the Lord's Table together. What follows is an explanation and brief exploration of why we as Lutheran Christians so cherish the gifts we get from Jesus in his holy supper.

______Prayer of Thanksgiving & Lord's Prayer *

(Explanation) In order to better understand the Prayer of Thanksgiving, recall the institution of the Lord's Supper from Matthew 26:26-28. While they were eating, Jesus took bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and gave it to his disciples, saying, "Take and eat; this is my body." Then he took a cup, and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you. This is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins. When we receive a gift, it is only natural to give thanks for the gift. It comes as no surprise, then, that from the earliest history of Christianity, believers regularly included a prayer of thanksgiving when they gathered to receive the Lord's Supper.

The Prayer of Thanksgiving traditionally concludes with the Lord's Prayer. As Jesus' model prayer concludes our prayer of thanksgiving for salvation and the Sacrament, we experience a pattern of prayer similar to the pattern of thoughts expressed by Paul in Romans 8:32. "He who did not spare his own Son, but gave himself up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things?" So also, in these two back-to-back prayers, we give thanks in the Prayer of Thanksgiving for the blessings of salvation given to us in Jesus, and then we pray that God would also provide "all things" we need in the concluding Lord's Prayer.

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- **P:** Among many Christians, the words of Jesus that we refer to as the Words of Institution are nothing more than an historical report: this is what Jesus did and what he said. Period. We have been blessed to know, however, that these words mean much more. They do what they say. According to the command of Christ, we celebrate the Lord's Supper not as a mere meal of remembrance but as a Sacrament by which Jesus himself comes to us. We don't transport ourselves back in time; rather, he comes to us.
- C: Until we are in heaven he comes as our defender and deliverer. He gives his own body and blood as the medicine of immortality. Here we find strength for our journey to heaven.

Agnus Dei (Lamb of God) *	
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- **P:** This song is a beautiful little confession of sins as we come forward, confident that do we receive his forgiveness in the Supper. The text reminds us that Jesus is the sacrifice that all of the Old Testament sacrifices pointed to. His sacrifice on the cross has won the forgiveness of sins for the entire world.
- C: We come forward to the altar to personally receive his gift of forgiveness. The body he gave and the blood he shed as a sacrifice on the cross are received in the Sacrament.

(Explanation) Luther wrote, "The Agnus Dei, above all songs, serves well for the sacrament, for it clearly sings about and praises Christ for having borne our sins and in beautiful, brief words powerfully and sweetly teaches the remembrance of Christ."

The Distribution	*

- **P:** Tonight, sadly, we must forego the distribution. But it is appropriate for us to crave what God gives us in this sacrament: to quote the Catechism, "where there is forgiveness of sin there is also life and salvation." Forgiveness is not only God dealing with my guilt and its consequences. It is also spiritual nutrition by which he regularly nourishes my relationship with him and medicine by which he heals my spiritual illness.
- C: What a precious gift! What a loving Lord to so feed and strengthen us! So we look forward to the day when the current crisis has abated and we can again gather in the Lord's house.

Nunc Dimittis *

(Explanation) After receiving the Lord's Supper, we often join in singing the Song of Simeon. Simeon was a man who got to see and hold the newborn baby Jesus. God had promised Simeon earlier in his life that he would not die until he saw the long-promised Messiah. God kept that

promise. When Mary and Joseph brought the newborn Jesus into the temple for the first time to present him to the Lord, Simeon took the baby up in his arms and sang the words of this song. What fitting words for us to sing after receiving the Lord's Supper! We too have seen and have touched the Lord's body and blood, which have come to us in a physical way in the bread and wine of the Supper. So we like Simeon can depart from the Lord's house in peace, assured that our sins are forgiven and that we are right with God.

Thanksgiving *

(Explanation) After the Song of Simeon, the pastor addresses the people: "O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good." The congregation responds: "and his mercy endures forever." These are words from Psalm 118—part of the ancient Jewish liturgy for high festivals. This Psalm was sung after the Passover meal. It was during the Passover meal that Jesus, the Lamb of God, instituted the Lord's Supper. It is only appropriate then that we say the same words that the people of God have sung for centuries after this meal.

- **P:** Because of the forgiveness of sins that has just been given to us, our hearts are filled with thanksgiving for what God has done for us through the Passover Lamb—his Son, Jesus. The word we translate as "mercy" is the Hebrew word for God's faithful love.
- C: Even though we have been unfaithful to God, God's faithful love endures forever. It will never go away. God's faithfulness, goodness, and mercy comfort us as we enter another week of life in this sinful world.

THE BENEDICTION

P: The Lord bless you and keep you.

The Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious to you.

The Lord look on you with favor and † give you peace.

C: Amen.

THE CLOSING SONG "Man of Sorrows"

vs:1-4 (p. 9)

At church, after the benediction in the evening service the altar is stripped, marking the transition from the celebration of Holy Communion to Jesus' crucifixion and death.

Symbolically, the Lord Jesus, stripped of his power and glory, is now in the hands of his captors.

The events of Good Friday are near.
