*Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers, for by so doing some people have shown hospitality to angels without knowing it.*  
**Hebrews 13:2**

Abraham and Lot lived as strangers in a strange land but made their living throughout Canaan. God promised Abraham that his descendants would live in that land, but it was just Abraham and his extended family at that moment. Both Abraham and Lot, in their own circumstances, showed hospitality to strangers. After welcoming them in, it soon became apparent that they were entertaining angels. God blessed them immensely through those visitors.

While inviting complete strangers into our homes might seem a bit odd, what other ways can we show hospitality to strangers? We can be kind and compassionate. We can look for the visitor at church, challenge our “comfort conversation zone” by introducing ourselves and welcoming them—maybe even inviting them out for brunch after church!
