The Triduum

The three days of Holy Week, Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter, are the climax of the church year. Throughout the centuries, these three services were viewed as one continuous service that began on Holy Thursday and ended on Easter morning.

Part I. Holy Thursday

Holy Thursday marks the end of Lent proper and begins the Triduum. At the conclusion of the worship service, there is no blessing or benediction. Instead, the candles and communion vessels are removed. The altar is stripped, symbolizing the abandonment of Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Part II. Good Friday

Good Friday's first service is the service of the cross. This service is a meditative service focusing on the redemption of Christ, and prayer. Good Friday's second service is known as a *Tenebrae* (darkness) service. This service centers on a reflection of the Lord's crucifixion and our repentance. As the service progresses, seven candles are extinguished, one candle at a time, until only one candle remains. That candle is removed from the chancel, leaving the sanctuary in darkness. The service is closed by a loud noise called a *strepitus* that foreshadows the rending of Christ's tomb on Easter. The solitary candle is then returned to the sanctuary, anticipating the joy of Easter morning.

Part III. Easter Sunday

Easter morning is the climax to the Triduum. The service begins with the joyous cry "Christ is risen!" to which the congregation responds, "He is risen indeed!" The entire Easter morning service is a celebration of Christ's victory over sin and death and the power of the devil. That joy climaxes as the worshipper receives once again the blessing of the Lord at the conclusion of the service. The joy of Easter then continues throughout the rest of the church year.

"A 'reproach' is a conveyance of disapproval or blame. The Solemn Reproaches (also called the Improperia) were first used in the liturgy in the 800s. They are poetic renderings expressing the remonstrance of God with his people. They follow the pattern of Psalm 78, which rehearses God's continuing acts of faithfulness and Israel's repeated rebellion."

Galatians 3:10-13


¹⁰For all who rely on the works of the law are under a curse, as it is written: "Cursed is everyone who does not continue to do everything written in the Book of the Law." ¹¹Clearly no one who relies on the law is justified before God, because "the righteous will live by faith." ¹²The law is not based on faith; on the contrary, it says, "The person who does these things will live by them." ¹³Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us, for it is written: "Cursed is everyone who is hung on a pole."

Gospel John 19:17–30

¹⁷Carrying his own cross, he went out to the place of the Skull (which in Aramaic is called Golgotha). ¹⁸There they crucified him, and with him two others—one on each side and Jesus in the middle.

¹⁹Pilate had a notice prepared and fastened to the cross. It read: Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. ²⁰Many of the Jews read this sign, for the place where Jesus was crucified was near the city, and the sign was written in Aramaic, Latin and Greek. ²¹The chief priests of the Jews protested to Pilate, "Do not write 'The King of the Jews,' but that this man claimed to be king of the Jews."

²²Pilate answered, "What I have written, I have written."

²³When the soldiers crucified Jesus, they took his clothes, dividing them into four shares, one for each of them, with the undergarment remaining. This garment was seamless, woven in one piece from top to bottom.

²⁴"Let's not tear it," they said to one another. "Let's decide by lot who will get it." This happened that the scripture might be fulfilled that said,

"They divided my clothes among them

and cast lots for my garment."

So this is what the soldiers did.

²⁵Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. ²⁶When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to her, "Woman, here is your son," ²⁷and to the disciple, "Here is your mother." From that time on, this disciple took her into his home.

²⁸Later, knowing that everything had now been finished, and so that Scripture would be fulfilled, Jesus said, "I am thirsty." ²⁹A jar of wine vinegar was there, so they soaked a sponge in it, put the sponge on a stalk of the hyssop plant, and lifted it to Jesus' lips. ³⁰When he had received the drink, Jesus said, "It is finished." With that, he bowed his head and gave up his spirit.
